

With 116 registered students and 34 active sectional members, the FFA chapter at Paris Cooperative High School is Edgar County's largest branch of the National FFA Organization. The students enrolled in the national program are more than "AG kids or those who plan to be farmers." They are future leaders and entrepreneurs, according to the high school's FFA advisor, Kiarra En-

"While agriculture is at the heart of what we do, FFA offers opportunities in leadership, business, science, mechanics and more," Englum said. "Our members come from all backgrounds, with a variety of interests, but they all share a common goal: personal growth and career success."

Englum explained the FFA motto, "Learning to Do, Doing to Learn, Earning to Live, Living to Serve," is something the group strives "to embody every day."

"(The motto) reflects the handson learning experiences FFA provides, the work ethic we develop and the commitment we have to serving our community," she said. "Whether it's through classroom education, career development events or community service projects, our chapter is dedicated to preparing students for bright futures both in and beyond agriculture."

The Paris FFA chapter's primary focus is leadership and preparing students for life outside of high school. Attending career development competitions, various leadership conferences, participating in community service events and planning fundraisers are ways the students gain first-hand experiences and branch out of their comfort zones.

"We do our best to ensure our students make the most out of their FFA careers and are able to experience all options possible offered through this amazing program," En-

and internship programs that help students gain hands-on experience in agriculture, business and other industries.

"Many local farms and agribusinesses support us by offering tours, hosting workshops, and sharing their expertise with our students," Englum said. "We encourage students to get involved in FFA by showing them that it offers something for everyone, no matter their background or career interests. Whether they enjoy leadership, hands-on projects, public speaking FFA with others, our community plays a vital role in strengthening our program," she explained. "By working together, we can continue to create opportunities that prepare students for success in agriculture and beyond ...Our Paris FFA Chapter thrives because of the incredible support from our community, and there are many ways people can continue to help us grow. Attending our events, such as our annual pancake breakfast and FFA auction, not only provides financial support but also shows our members that their hard work is valued."

On a personal level, the advisor shared how much the chapter enjoys community service events.

"It truly warms my heart to see the students eager to help improve our community," Englum said. "Whether it be through the other local schools, city clean up days, Christmas basket deliveries or just helping community members out with tasks when asked. We really do have a great group of students with the biggest hearts."

Englum encouraged local businesses and individuals to continue supporting the local chapter by sponsoring scholarships, donating resources, providing opportunities for students to job shadow or intern and by simply showing up.

"The FFA is an inclusive community where anyone from any background can find their place," she said. "It is a great way to get out of your comfort zone and try something new. With a strong commitment to service and education, student members at Shiloh School's FFA are going beyond the classroom to support local farmers, teach younger students about agriculture and bring their community together.

"Our chapter's biggest objectives are community service and agriculture education," Shiloh FFA advisor Emma Ennis said. "When it comes to community service, we love to focus on our farmers. Our favorite event is when we provide lunch for farmers during harvest season as they drive through the grain elevator."

During the annual harvest community service event, Shiloh FFA members partner with local farmers to supply food and drinks. The students hand-pack lunches and deliver them to drivers in the seats of their vehicles at two different grain elevators.

"Our members are very hard-working, capable and have a heart for service," Ennis said. "Whether there is a chance to lend a helping hand, solve a problem or set an example of leadership, Shiloh FFA members always rise to the occasion."






