## Council to vote on Purple Heart City designation tonight

Organization asks Lebanon  
to join Purple Heart Trail effort

The city of Lebanon has been asked to become a Purple Heart City by the Military Order of the Purple Heart.

Members of the Lebanon City Council are set to take up the designation tonight during its regularly scheduled meeting, which begins at 7 p.m.

Lebanon Mayor Lyle Anderson told The Daily Record Sunday that the designation is a great accomplishment for Lebanon because of the area's patriotism and support of veterans, as well as its support for current service members and the military's mission at nearby Fort Leonard Wood.

"This is one of the few times that I think I will be able to

predict the full support of the council," Anderson said.

A Purple Heart City means the city supports combat wounded veterans. Branson became the state's first Purple Heart City in 2013.

According to information City Administrator Chris Heard, the Lebanon designation is part of the Missouri Order of the Purple Heart Chapter's efforts to get communities along Interstate 44 and 40 to take part in the Purple Heart Trail designation process.

Heard said Sunday that no ceremony is planned for Monday's proclamation, if approved, but felt that a commemorative ceremony may be held at a later date.

## Phone scammer targets retailer

Caller claimed to be from the 'corporate office' and managed to get away with about \$500

A man claiming to be from the "corporate office" of the local Walgreen's store got away with about \$500 before workers at the local store figured out the man on the phone was actually a scam artist.

According to a report from the Lebanon Police Department, early last week a store employee reported that at about 4 a.m. on April 6, she received a telephone call from a man who identified himself

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as being from the corporate office and that she needed to remove prepaid debit cards from the shelf.

The woman told police that the man had a specific process for her to follow to remove the cards and instructed her to activate the cards at each of the store's registers in varying amounts, around \$500 each.

The store employee said she was then instructed to read the card numbers and to scratch off a serial number on the card and read that as well.

The woman said after she had done this to several cards, she started to get suspicious and had another store employee contact Walgreen's asset protection to verify the transactions. At that time, asset protection stated the call was a scam and that the transactions should be voided.

All of the transactions, except for one, which totaled about \$500, were voided. That transaction could not be voided because the balance had already been removed from the card.

The store employee said that the man on the phone had informed her that he would be sending a technician to retrieve the register transitions and the cards.

The investigation continues.

## Student says he was attacked in LHS locker room

Lebanon Police received a report of an assault at Lebanon High School Friday night that involved several students earlier that same day.

According to a report from the police department, the mother of a male student went to the LPD at about 6:30 p.m. to report that her son had been assaulted by another male student in a locker room at the high school and that several other students, including several student athletes, would not let him leave.

The mother of the alleged victim stated that her son was forced to go into the boys' locker room to retrieve property for another student, and when he went into the locker room, several students were waiting.

The victim stated that the other students surrounded him and that one of them attacked him, pushing him to the ground. The alleged attacker then started hitting and punching the boy in the face and in the back of the head.

The victim said that he tried to get up and leave, but

the other students allegedly blocked the door and would not allow him to exit the locker room.

Once the fight was over, the victim stated that everyone walked out, leaving him on the floor of the locker room. He told police that he spoke with an administrator of the school about the incident, which occurred at about 11:45 a.m., who instructed the student to go to the nurse's office.

Once he left the nurse's office, he was allegedly instructed to go back to class

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and that the administration would "handle everything," but he was never called back to the office.

The victim's mother stated that she was unsure why the school did not contact her or the police department, but she wished to make a report of the incident in case it ever happened again.

The mother was informed that a report would be completed and forwarded to the school resource officer.

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## Rays give up Heisey's slam, fall to Reds 12-4

### Reds take advantage of Tampa Bay's pitching injuries

CINCINNATI — Pitching with a short-handed staff caught up with the Tampa Bay Rays.

Chris Heisey hit his first grand slam and Devin Mesoraco homered and drove in career high-tying four runs as the Cincinnati Reds took advantage of the Rays' pitching injuries for a 12-4 victory on Sunday.

The Reds' best offensive showing of the season featured Mesoraco's three-run homer, Joey Votto's two-run shot and Heisey's pinch-hit slam in the eighth. Jay Bruce doubled, walked four times and scored four runs.

Zack Cozart got it going with a bases-loaded double off Cesar Ramos (0-1), making his first start of the season because of injuries.

Given how the past week had gone, they could have seen this one coming.

"One of those days, man," manager Joe Maddon said. "You

just file it and move on. This is less than the 30-minute rule. This is the 30-second rule. Just drop it and move on."

The Rays are 3-3 on a trip that has been tough on their rotation. Matt Moore went on the disabled list with a sore elbow on Tuesday, and Alex Cobb joined him Sunday with a strained oblique. Also, reliever Joel Peralta was sick, leaving him unavailable.

The injuries and illness affected the final game of the series. Cesar Ramos (0-1), who had made four relief appearances this season, started in Moore's place and helped the Reds' offense get unstuck. He left after giving up Votto's two-run homer in the third for a 4-2 lead.

"It was good the first inning, then just kind of fell apart a little in the second, came out in the third and they just jumped on the first strike I threw," Ramos said. "Things happened

quick."

Maddon even batted Ramos eighth, figuring that he'd have to pinch-hit for him early anyway.

The Reds salvaged the final game of their interleague series but remained in last place in the NL Central at 4-8. The hitters have been the biggest problem, tied for last in the majors heading into the game.

The Reds had season highs in runs — they hadn't scored more than six in any previous game — and hits with 13.

Left-hander Tony Cingrani (1-1) gave up five hits in 6 1-3 innings. Ben Zobrist homered from both sides of the plate, hitting two-run shots off Cingrani and right-hander Nick Christiani.

Cincinnati came into the game tied with San Diego for fewest runs in the majors with 28. Ramos helped the Reds get going by walking the bases loaded in the second. Cozart

hit a ground-rule double for his third hit of the season and a 2-0 lead.

"I wasn't missing by much," Ramos said. "I just didn't get a couple of strikes. That's the difference. You fall behind and you pay for it. I walked three guys in a row, which is unac-

ceptable."

Votto's second homer of the series sparked a 10-batter, five-run third inning. Ramos left after throwing 47 pitches. Brandon Gomes relieved and gave up Mesoraco's homer.

Mesoraco added a sacrifice fly in the fifth. The catch-

er opened the season on the disabled list with a strained oblique. In four games the past week, he went 7 for 14 with three doubles, two homers and six RBIs.

Heisey connected in the eighth off Josh Lueke for his seventh career pinch-hit homer.

## Davis' throwing error sends Twins over Royals Sunday

MINNEAPOLIS — Pitcher Wade Davis made a wild flip home on a comebacker in the eighth inning and the Minnesota Twins rallied past the Kansas City Royals 4-3 Sunday for a three-game sweep.

A madcap sequence put the Twins ahead and a crazy play ended it, too.

With two outs and none on in the ninth, Mike Moustakas popped a ball straight up. As he stood to watch it in the

batter's box, catcher Kurt Suzuki tripped over him, resulting in an interference call for the final out.

After the Royals scored three times in the eighth for a 3-2 lead, reliever Aaron Crow (0-1) walked two Minnesota batters to start the bottom half.

Davis struck out Joe Mauer, but Trevor Plouffe walked to load the bases. Chris Herrmann then hit a tapper back to the mound and Davis, hoping to begin an easy

double play, hesitated briefly after getting the ball out of his glove.

Davis' toss sailed past catcher Salvador Perez. Pedro Florimon scored the tying run and Brian Dozier slid home under Perez's return throw to Davis covering the plate.

Casey Fien (1-0) got one out and Glen Perkins posted his third save.

The Royals have lost their first five road games this season, managing just nine runs. Kansas City was outscored 21-

5 in the sweep at Target Field.

Josmil Pinto hit his third homer in the seventh inning to give the Twins a 2-0 lead.

Twins starter Kevin Correia cruised through seven innings before running into trouble in the eighth. He allowed three runs on six hits in seven innings.

Eric Hosmer's RBI double capped the Royals' three-run eighth.

Not wearing sleeves despite a gametime temperature of 42 degrees, Jason Vargas held

## Red Wings keep Blues down with 3-0 shutout

ST. LOUIS — Backup goalie Petr Mrazek kept the injury-riddled St. Louis Blues down heading into the playoffs with his second career shutout in a 3-0 victory for the Detroit Red Wings on Sunday.

The Blues had been in contention for the No. 1 overall seed but lost their last six and missed a chance at taking the Central Division with Colorado clinching on a tiebreaker before playing at Anaheim Sunday night. Minus three of their top five scorers, their top faceoff man and two top defensemen, they were shut out for the second straight game and third time during the slump.

Justin Abdelkader scored twice, Riley Sheahan added a goal and Pavel Datsyuk had two assists for the Red Wings, who are locked into the eighth seed in the Eastern Conference playoffs and will play Boston.

## The rabbit may have been on to something

Carrots are filled with vitamins and great for small gardens

It's not surprising that "carrot" describes a lure or incentive. Sweet, full of vitamins and antioxidants, carrots should entice you as a winner for your home garden.

"If we're talking about a limited amount of garden space and we want to grow as much nutritional value as we can, carrots are a good choice," said David Trinklein, horticulture specialist for University of Missouri Extension. "This is a vegetable that is extremely nutritious."

### Planting

This cool-season vegetable does not transplant well, so carrots should be seeded directly into the garden. Germination is the biggest hurdle. Trinklein says by investing a little money, you can help the carrot seedlings get a good start.

"I suggest instead of covering the seeds with soil, cover them with a soilless medium containing peat moss, vermiculite and perlite," Trinklein said. "This

will keep the seeds moist without crusting over, which is a real problem if you cover the seeds with clay-type soil."

If you don't want to buy a soilless medium, you will need

young carrots are the tastiest and can go raw into salads. Later you will get succulent carrots that are great for cooking and, finally, you can harvest full-grown carrots. He says it's best not to

leave mature carrots in the ground too long because the root will eventually become woody and fibrous.

Since carrot seed is fairly inexpensive, Trinklein says it's best if you seed densely into relatively light soil.

### Growing

As the seedlings come up, you can thin them at various degrees of maturity, Trinklein said. The

carefully.

"One of the things you have to worry about is timing the addition of nitrogen because it can cause secondary growth and the root will start to split," Trinklein said.

### History

Carrots are an ancient plant originally grown for medicinal properties. They're believed to have originated in Afghanistan thousands of years ago. Those early plants were nothing like today's tasty carrot.

"You would not want to eat a carrot from that era. It probably would be more than you could stomach," Trinklein said. "They were thought to be bitter and rather pungent. This has largely been eliminated via plant breeding."

### Nutrition

This extremely versatile vegetable is good raw or cooked, and it has a longer refrigerator storage life than many other fresh vegetables, said Tammy Roberts, nutrition specialist for University of Missouri Extension.

"A half cup of carrots has only 25 calories and 6 grams of carbohydrate," Roberts said. "There is 2 grams of fiber and 210 percent of the daily value of vitamin A for

the day."

Carrots actually provide more antioxidants when they're cooked, Roberts says. Cooking, however, destroys nutrients like vitamin C. She recommends eating both raw and cooked carrots to get the greatest benefit.

"Best of all, carrots are a favorite for many children," Roberts said.

This nutritious vegetable is easy to grow and one your kids will eat willingly. With so many advantages, it's no small wonder that Bugs Bunny carried carrots with him everywhere.

## A cut that never heals

Damage from mower, trimmer can mean a slow death to trees

SPRINGFIELD — Homeowners might be their trees' worst enemy if they don't take care when using mowers and weed eaters around them.

"Trees don't heal from cuts like we do, so a lawn mower scrape, or a trimmer slash, creates a permanent injury," said Patrick Byers, horticulture specialist with University of Missouri Extension. "Once the underlying wood is exposed, you've put out a welcome sign for diseases and pests to attack your trees."

Many an older tree has succumbed to internal rot that originated with damage caused years earlier.

According to Byers, there is an easy way to avoid this kind of damage. Remove the grass and weeds from around the tree. Not only will it make it unnecessary to mow near the tree, the tree will not have to compete for the nutrients and water.

Spreading mulch of leaves, grass clippings or straw around trees will keep weeds



and grass under control and will give the tree base an attractive appearance. Plus, these organic mulches will help conserve moisture, keep soil temperatures stable, and add nutrients to the soil.

"Damage by mowers and weed trimmers isn't a tree problem, it's a people problem. That mighty oak may look invincible, but careless mowing and weed trimming can cause it to die, slowly, from a thousand small cuts," said Byers.

And if you would prefer to work outside the home in addition to raising the children, consider submitting your resumes to other companies.

Man jailed after traffic stop

A Lebanon man is behind bars at the Laclede County Jail after drugs were allegedly found in his truck during a routine traffic stop.

Michael Joe Carter, 32, faces a class C felony of possession of a controlled substance. Carter is being held in the Laclede County Jail in lieu of a \$15,000 cash-or-surety bond. On Thursday, he pleaded not guilty and is scheduled to be back in court for a hearing on May 19, according to online court records.

Just after midnight on Tuesday, a Lebanon Police officer monitoring traffic at Garfield and Fourth streets reported seeing a truck cross the intersection without stopping at the stop sign. The officer activated his emergency lights and conducted a traffic stop at the intersection of Second and Taylor streets, according to a probable cause statement released by the Laclede County Prosecuting Attorney’s office. Carter, who was the driver of the vehicle, appeared to be “very nervous” while speaking with the officer. Carter was asked to exit the vehicle, so the officer could conduct a frisk of his person for safety reasons. During the frisk, the officer located a clear plastic baggie containing marijuana residue, the statement said.

The officer also patted down the passenger in the truck, a 23-year-old Lebanon man, but did not find anything on his person.

Carter claimed there was nothing illegal in his truck. When the officer asked if he could search it, Carter allegedly said, “Go ahead. I have nothing to hide.”

The officer walked his K-9 partner around the vehicle. The dog gave a positive indication of narcotics in the car. Carter allegedly admitted that there might be “two bongos” in his back seat. During further search of the truck, the officer found a marijuana smoking device, a rolling machine and three white pills that were later identified as Alza, a schedule-2 controlled substance, according to the statement.

Carter allegedly admit-

ted to owning everything found in the vehicle except the pills.

Carter was arrested and taken to the Laclede County

Jail. He was issued citations for failure to register his motor vehicle and failure to stop at a stop sign, the statement said.
